Course Description

This course focuses on improving students' abilities in reading comprehension and building spelling and vocabulary skills. Attention is paid to reading skills such as identifying the main and supporting ideas, using context clues for vocabulary, and summarizing/paraphrasing.

- E. Make a sequence of story events.
- F. Identify main ideas and supporting details
- G. Distinguish relevant information from irrelevant information
- H. Understand cause-and-effect relationships in stories
- I. Make inferences using the information presented in stories
