Course Description

This course, as a continuation of ESL 201A/201B, provides opportunities to develop existing knowledge of grammar structures and acquire new ones with the emphasis on the use of present, past, and future tense, pronouns and phrasal verbs, and modals and similar expressions. Writing and speaking activities are included in the class to provide opportunities to practice grammatical structures that students acquire in class.

- A. Integrate all four language skills: reading, writing, speaking, and listening with strong grammatical competence
- B. Express their thoughts and opinions using complex grammatical structures
- C. Use the grammar points in more communicative ways
- D. Use definite and indefinite articles properly.
- E. Make sentences with comparisons and superlatives.
- F. Form sentences and questions using the present perfect form of the verbs
- G. Distinguish the differences between the present perfect progressive and present perfect

- H. Complete sentences with gerunds, as well as choosing between the affirmative and negative
- I. Complete sentences with the infinitive form of verbs and with "too," or "enough"
